Each week we set a team challenge so the children have to work together and that means the boy on the autism spectrum is part of the team. At times it is the team working around him but the end product is always a team effort.

Coventry Libraries and Information Service

Coventry Libraries and Information Service are making some changes to a community library, testing out some of the latest thinking about what makes a public library 'autism' friendly. Inspiration came from the ASCEL conference, which encouraged Librarians to think about library spaces and look at how some small changes to the environment can make a big difference to some of the most vulnerable users, in this case children with autism and their families.

The library have ordered some books for children and parents, comfortable beanbags, sensory seat cushions and some I pads. The library will be remodelled to increase the space available within the children's library. At the moment we are forging new links with professionals in the city who lead on autism to get their advice about best practice which also is a great way of advertising what we are doing. We then hope to bring together children and families to look at the ideas and the space available and help us to create a space that meets their needs and also the needs of other people using the library The plan will then be to create some activities e.g. code clubs, family time for families affected by autism to use the space and access information.
